

2020 Youth Ministry Annual Report

What a year 2020 has been! Like most aspects of life this year, our Youth program was put on hold in terms of operating as the kids and I had become accustomed to. Please know that this does NOT mean that we did not have a Youth program at all this year! But again, our program was forced to take a different turn than in past years. Please also note that like the rest of our staff, my primary focus will ALWAYS be the safety of our kids and their families, as well as the safety and wellness of myself and my family. With all of that being said, I would like to provide you with a glimpse of what 2020 looked like for the PCW Youth.

Our year began like any other year for us as we headed to Lancaster for Winter Camp from January 10-12th. The theme this year that was chosen by Mid-Winter Advance, was "Chaos." Talk about foreshadowing! The kids had an absolute BLAST and I was so thrilled that we added two of our younger students to the group this year for a total of 8 students who represented Woodbury on this Regional event! As a whole, West Jersey Presbytery sent 17 students to this camp. The fact that we made up half of that total is something I am very proud of. At the end of the month, we hosted a Regional Super Bowl Party. We had 5 Woodbury students participate out of a total of 10 students who were able to attend. Again, Woodbury had half the attendance. I was beginning to see the fruitfulness of the previous seeds I had planted to grow the program. 2020 seemed as though it was going to be "our year."

In February, the kids and I participated in the long tradition of "30 Hour Famine." This year, the regional leaders decided to not have the event be a sleepover. We had it as a one day event on Saturday, February 22nd. Our students still did service projects throughout the region as well as packed 53 boxes containing 10,176 meals for the Greater Woodbury Cooperative Food Bank. Again, we had no idea then just how crucial these meals would be this year more than ever for people in our community.

Suddenly, March hit. In the blink of an eye, months of planning for events began to unravel. It seemed the word used most often over the next several months would be, "cancelled." Lenten Bible study- cancelled. Movie outings- cancelled. "Mac Madness Competitions"-cancelled. Mission trips and pool parties-cancelled, cancelled, CANCELLED!!! The planning, re-planning, and re-planning again that took place in any effort to try to make these events possible, was nothing short of exhausting for myself and the other regional youth leaders. Our hearts broke every time we had to tell the kids that another event would not take place due to COVID-19. We missed seeing them get together and bond with each other and us. We missed seeing their smiling faces. We even missed how loud they could get!

As the school shutdowns and stay at home orders continued through March and into April, it was clear that we had to come up with some way to be able to see the kids. We decided on two different ZOOM Bible studies. The first was an Easter study and took place in April. The second was on "Uncertainty" and took place in May. The topic came about because myself and the other regional leaders felt like we needed to find a way to help acknowledge the fears of the kids, but also use this experience to help them learn how to rely more on Jesus during these difficult times. We had a really good turnout for both studies and the kids really appreciated the opportunity to see each other on a regular basis, even through a screen. We had approximately 10 students participating up to twice a week for 8 weeks. Again, half of those students were Woodbury students. We also delivered small treat bags to all the Youth group students filled with Easter treats.

As the summer approached, it now became clear that screen time was getting to us all. The kids and the leaders were all experiencing "screen fatigue." We decided to take a break for the summer. As cases

continued to rise within the state, it also became clear that hope for in person get togethers throughout the summer would have to wait as well. However, as the end of summer approached and I was soon going to be heading off to Princeton for seminary, I decided to try a socially distanced farewell BBQ. Everyone brought their own chairs and we had plenty of space outside. We all wore our masks as well. It was great to see them all in person, especially before leaving for school. I decided to not try to hold any events in September so that I could adjust to my class schedule and course load. However, in October, I held one last socially distanced BBQ while we still had the weather to allow it. It worked just as well as the summer one and was a real bright spot for me and the kids in the midst of so much distress.

November and December were quiet months again as COVID cases continued to rise within our state. This was difficult as traditionally we would be having "Friendsgiving" and our annual Christmas party. Not having those events was definitely hard. The other leaders and myself wanted to make sure the kids still had something from their church as a reminder we were thinking about them during the holidays. I delivered 9 personalized gifts to our PCW Youth group members.

While most of 2020 did not allow for in-person contact between myself and the students at various events, I was able to keep in touch with them through technology. In addition to the ZOOM meetings, I was able to text and FaceTime the kids. I am beyond grateful that they still feel comfortable enough to reach out to me in times of trouble in their lives so I can help counsel them through some of these difficulties.

I thank you for another year to have the privilege to help guide the students of our church, as well as the other students of West Jersey Presbytery along their faith journeys. Thank you all for your prayers, donations, and continued support for this program, as well as your support on my seminary journey as well. May God continue to work in wondrous ways in the lives of these students throughout this next year and continue to watch over us all to stay healthy.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND WORSHIP TASK FORCE:

Christian Education and Worship Task Forces have been combined and meet the first Monday of each month with members Milt Fredericks, Dawn Witherspoon, Janice Brown, John Franchetti, Connie Wagoner, Priscilla Flynn, Barbara Sommers, Kathy Federici, Erik Hill, Kristen Franchetti (Coordinator of Christian Education) and the chair, Eric Campo. The Task Force coordinates work with Kristen Franchetti, the Flower Coordinator and the child Acolyte supervisor.

The Task Force has the responsibility of planning and providing educational opportunities that encourage the spiritual growth of people of all ages under in coordination with Kristin Franchetti as the Coordinator of Education. Regular Church School is offered from September to June for beginners through adults. Curriculums are researched by the Coordinator, evaluated and recommended by the Task Force for Session approval. In addition, devotional materials are selected for Advent and Lent, with block scheduling, which has improved scheduling with attendance and securing teachers. Small Group participation is considered an important part of our personal faith development. Christian Education also hosts events throughout the year such Rally Day, Advent Holiday Party, Bibles, Lenten Service Project, Women's Retreat, and the Church Picnic.

Another major focus of the Task Force is assisting in developing and evaluating worship services in coordination with Pastor Oehler, including the following efforts:

- Worship Task Force oversees the worship service review and worship budget.
- Serving the Holy Sacrament of Communion by ordained Elders.
- Overseeing special services, the music of worship services, and Acolytes for worship service.
- In addition, the Worship Task Force budgets for refreshments in conjunction with Deacons, publications for Devotions and Christian information including the Upper Room and Palm Gardens, gifts and special honoring such as Acolytes and Fifty-Year members.
- Other duties include moving action before the Session for pulpit supply, tracking Church attendance, membership, Children's Message review, worship pamphlets, and obtaining readers for worship services.
- The Worship Task Force also organizes effort to administer Home Bound Communion Program.

One of the major initiatives started in 2020 was the development of online services. This effort was tried and expanded under the leadership of Pastor Oehler and Staff along with the purchase of new more sophisticated equipment and monitors. Given the pandemic and the need for online services, this effort has been achieved and will continue to be evaluated for improvements. The Task Force has not met in person and will resume in-person meetings once it has been deemed safe to do so.

Mission and Outreach Task Force

The Mission and Outreach Task Force dispersed \$38,000 to local, national and international missions. We again strived for 1/3 of the funds for local, 1/3 of the funds for national, and 1/3 of the funds for international missions. This year we also joined with the Membership and Outreach Task Force in an effort to streamline the work of the two task forces.

Covid 19 restrictions held us back from planning activities this year. We had the intent, and were well on our way to planning at least one activities per month when all in-person meetings and activities were suspended in mid-March. We had to cancel our March activity which was Prayers and Bingo at the GG Green building. Other activities planned but not held were Bring a Friend to Church Sunday, a church booth at the Lot 323 Summer gatherings, a booth at the Woodbury Car Show in September, participation in the Woodbury Fall Parade, and the ever popular Dee's Alternative Market in December. We will resume these and other activities when the danger of Covid 19 is past.

An activity that we planned and carried out through the summer was a weekly telephone wellness check. We combined our task force members with the Deacons and attempted to contact each of our members weekly, as just a simple check-in to see if everyone was ok during the height of pandemic this summer. We also helped support Becky Schad's beginning semester at Princeton Theological Seminary.

In late summer we held a drive-through food drive to benefit the Greater Woodbury Cooperative Ministries Food Bank. It was supported by the Boy Scouts and Explorers. Everyone considered it a great success.

We had a mission trip to Cuba scheduled for April with 4 adults and 3 teenagers attending. The trip was another victim of Covid 19. Cuba has been hit hard by Covid, a lack of food and medicine, and the conversion of two money systems into one. Our contacts in Placetas are still maintaining their elderly breakfast and laundry program though it all. As soon as it is safe both here and in Cuba, another trip will be scheduled.

We are also supporting the South Woodbury Neighborhood Preservation Program by offering our facilities for meetings, again when it becomes safe to do so.

We again have a \$39,000 mission budget to disperse in 2021. We again will be supporting local missions of Urban Promise, Habitat for Humanity, Seeds of Hope, Family Promise, and the Boys and Girls Club of Gloucester County. Support for the West Jersey Presbytery, Synod of the Northeast and the General Assembly continues. While some of our previous mission partners have dropped off, we continue to look for local, national and international opportunities.

2020 Trustees Report

Listing of major initiatives for the year

- -The sanctuary roof was replaced this year by Ken Morton & Sons LLC. There has been an ongoing struggle to identify and stop the leaking, for years, and after numerous unsuccessful tries at spot patching, it was decided that the only solution was to identify why the roof was leaking and fix the problem. This project included removing all the existing shingles, gutters, fascia and crown molding. After the shingles were removed and some structural work was done, the existing planking (entire roof) was covered with 1/2" plywood. The soffits were removed and replaced and the entire roof had new shingles installed. Cost \$72,000. Shingles are guaranteed for 25 years.
- -Additional roof repairs were made to the Choir room prior to painting.
- -The Christian Education wing was painted this year by Talented Touch Painting LLC, Chris Shockey. This work included much patching, caulk work and preparation in order to paint the areas. The cost was \$15,310.00 Many thanks to Chris Shockey for his fine work and extreme patience doing his work in a very trying time.
- -The Christian Education wing was also carpeted this year. The work was done by Abbey Carpet, and I would also like to thank them for a fine job in most trying times.
- -The work on the basement windows by Bernie Carlson has been halted due to the COVID-19.
- -Many thanks to Jan Edick for her work this year to keep the building clean and safe. Additionally, she has done much painting to supplement our painting project and has mopped, shop vacuumed and cleaned up after each flooding event. The flooding can, depending upon the rain event, extend from the exit door in Fellowship Hall thru the kitchen, pantry, Jan's office, boiler room and ultimately to the electrical room.
- -There will, in the future, hopefully this year, be a need to have the steeple repaired and repainted. There is no estimate for this work.
- -The Board added additional Cyber security to our insurance coverage with our carrier. The cost for the year is \$750.00
- -The Board approved a motion to hire Perfect Basement LLC to provide a system which will prevent flooding in the basement. The cost is \$19,465, rounded to \$25,000 for unforeseen conditions.
- -The Board endorsed 2 proposals to purchase camera equipment and ancillary items to permit services to be streamed online. This project was funded with PPP loan proceeds.

Much work and many funds have been expended in the <u>past 10</u>, <u>plus or minus years</u> for building maintenance/improvements. I believe the church property to be in good condition.

The sanctuary has a new roof, new windows, new lighting, painting of the room and all pews. It should be many years before additional work is necessary. The organ has been upgraded, which I understand will not be required again for many years.

The chapel has been totally redone, as it was originally, with new flooring, lighting, painting, sound system and HVAC systems for all season use. It will be many years before any additional work will be necessary.

The kitchen has been upgraded with a new stove, flooring and ceiling. A commercial refrigerator was donated by Investors Bank. The kitchen serves our current purposes, however there may be a need in the future to upgrade the sinks, add a commercial dishwasher, etc, should the Community Dinner ministry continue to grow and flourish.

Fellowship Hall has been upgraded with painting, new ceiling, new storage areas, and new tables and chairs and a new door (which collapsed due to flooding). It will many years before major investment is required.

The education wing has just been painted and carpeted. I do not believe major projects will be necessary for many years. A future need will either be a roof improvement or a window project.

The exterior of the building has had new entrance steps and Center Street added new sidewalk and a handicap ramp as part of the elevator project.

When the basement dewatering system is completed, the basement area will be in a much improved condition. The exterior walls will have exterior water pressure reduced and the adverse impact upon our electrical room which includes the blower for the organ will be reduced.

-There may be areas of concern in the future regarding the windows in the office(which suffers periodic flooding) and educational wing, the education wing roof, and someday the electrical system may need attention, but barring any unforeseen event, based upon the facts as I know them today, the immediate need of large capital expenditures, I believe will not be required for years.

This is my final report as a member of the Trustees, I have enjoyed my time on the Board and I want to thank the Board for their dedication to our church.

Pastors' Compensation 2021 Terms of Call

Our Personnel Commission and Session have reviewed the Pastors' compensation and voted on a 1.5% raise this year. The congregation is to vote on this proposed compensation to the Pastors' call. The congregation does not vote on the remainder of the church budget because the <u>Book of Order</u>, the Constitution of our Presbyterian Church (USA) clearly states the budget is the sole responsibility of our elected elders (G.10.0102.h).

Vacation: Six weeks (six or seven Sundays) plus two additional days (not Sundays)

Study Leave: Two weeks annually with full salary cumulative to six weeks

Compensation is based on some guidelines from our Presbytery on minimums and suggested annual increases for pastors.

Social Security: Each pastor pays social security as a "self-employed" person, paying both the employee's half and the employer's half as well according to the IRS. The employer's portion (7.65%) is reimbursed to them and tabulated separately from the employee's personal compensation.

The Housing Allowance and Retirement Savings Plan permits some tax benefits to the pastor. The pastor requests how the salary/housing allowance is to be split.

Travel and Continuing Ed expenses are reimbursed on an actual expense basis. Presbytery sets the minimum at \$3,000 for travel and \$750 for Continuing Ed.

Pension and Medical premiums are designated by our Board of Pensions. Most is used for the employee, but some is used by the denomination to aid some indigent and retired pastors. The amount is calculated by the Board of Pensions. The percentage for 2021 is 37% of the salary and housing allowance.
